University of Alabama UA Early College

Through the University of Alabama Early College program you can take college courses online or on campus while still in high school, earning up to 30 credit hours.

Cost: A high school student must have a 3.0 to be admitted to UA Early College. High school students that live outside the state of Alabama are eligible for a 25% tuition scholarship if they have a 3.5 (or higher) high school GPA. This means that out-of-state UA Early College students' tuition is reduced to \$281.25 per credit hour with a 3.5 (or higher) high school GPA. Click here for more cost information.

Seniors:

Have you filed the FAFSA yet? Indiana's priority deadline for filing the FAFSA each year is April 15. Financial Aid is provided on a first-come, first-served basis beyond April 15. Additionally, you should ALWAYS check with your college/the colleges you hope to attend to make sure they don't have an earlier deadline. Some colleges also have additional financial aid paperwork, so make sure you aren't missing anything important.

As a reminder, beginning with the Class of 2024, the state of [Indiana requires seniors to file the FAFSA](#). If you are not planning to file the FAFSA this year, I will need to have you complete the opt-out form included in my email sent on March 4.
