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MR. SCOTT HUTCHINS RECEIVES SAINT THEODORA GUERIN EXCELLENCE IN EDUCATION AWARD

Congratulations to **Assistant Principal-Director of Students Mr. Scott Hutchins '91**, who has been chosen as the Indianapolis Archdiocesan recipient of the Saint Theodora Guerin Excellence in Education Award. This award is the highest honor for Catholic educators in the archdiocese, which includes 2,000 teachers at 69 schools.

Mr. Hutchins is in his seventh year as an administrator and his 17th as a chemistry teacher and assistant baseball coach. He received this top honor at an all-school assembly following a liturgy to celebrate Catholic Schools Week last Thursday. His wife, sons and parents were also in attendance.

Mr. Hutchins said he was humbled to have been selected. "More than anything, I'm just so thankful I can get an award for doing what I love to do every day," he said. "It may sound cliché, but getting to do what I love is already a reward in itself."

Providence **Principal Dr. Mindy Ernstberger '74** said Mr. Hutchins' dedication to Providence, its students and its mission made him the ideal candidate for the award. "As a man of great personal faith, Scott is truly dedicated to Catholic education for the right reasons," Dr. Ernstberger said. "He brings prayer and a true understanding of ministry to his job every day, never losing sight of the mission and vision of our school and the well-being of our students."

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The Saint Theodora Guerin Excellence in Education Award was created to honor exemplary teachers in the Archdiocese of Indianapolis for their dedication and commitment to the Catholic teaching profession and to the students they serve. Mr. Hutchins was one of nine finalists from throughout the archdiocese nominated by their pastors, principals, colleagues and school parents as outstanding examples of what it means to be a Catholic school educator. He will represent Providence at the April 2013 National Catholic Educational Association convention in Houston. He also will be honored at the summer 2013 archdiocesan Administrator's Conference in French Lick.

English teacher **Dr. Kathryn Jacobi** was a finalist of the Saint Theodora Guerin Excellence in Education Award in 2009.

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

MARCH FOR LIFE REFLECTION

In late January, about a dozen Providence students were part of a group of 38 students and 10 chaperones, including religion teacher **Mr. Scott Lutgring**, who traveled to Washington, D.C., for March for Life. Jan. 22 marked the 40th anniversary of the Supreme Court's decision in *Roe vs. Wade* that legalized abortion.

Here is a reflection from participant junior **Jessica Payne**:

"This year was the first year I attended the March for Life trip to Washington, D.C. I guess I never really thought about what an impact abortion has on the world until I went on this trip. The actual day of the march impacted me the most. The speakers talking about the issue really made me realize that this type of injustice needs to be stopped immediately; it can't wait. Seeing all of these people fighting for the same cause and all there despite the freezing weather was an amazing experience."

CATHOLIC SCHOOLS WEEK

Providence celebrated Catholic Schools Week last week with a variety of spirit wear days and two fundraisers to benefit charitable organizations. BLUE PRIDE ON DISPLAY

WELCOME, ARCHBISHOP TOBIN

In December, the **Most Rev. Joseph Tobin**, C.Ss.R., was installed as the sixth archbishop in Indiana. Last month, many of our students, families, faculty and staff welcomed Archbishop Tobin when he celebrated liturgy at

St. Mary of the Knobs Parish.

A native of Detroit, Archbishop Tobin is one of 13 children. He first professed his vows as a member of the Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer in 1973. He served as a parish priest in Detroit, Chicago and other communities before being called to Rome to serve as superior general of the Redemptorist Order from 1997 to 2009. He then was appointed secretary of the Vatican's Congregation for Institutes of Consecrated Life and Societies of Apostolic Life -- and ordained an archbishop in 2010.

PIONEERS REACHING OUT

SERVICE HAS ITS OWN REWARDS

The supercell tornado that destroyed homes, businesses and schools from Pekin to Hanover last March 2 inspired people from around the country to help people in these communities. This is a story of how several Providence families unknowingly came together to help one family and were forever changed by it.

Julie (Happel) Parsons '76 knew that her family was large enough to raise money to help a family in need. She and her sister, **Melodee (Happel) McNames '70**, began asking people to help and inspired the Glotzbach family to sponsor a separate family. Parsons inquired about families in need and said she went through a list of at least 20 people in the Henryville area who turned down her help for various reasons. Finally, she found the **Ron Hughes** family of Otisco.

The Hughes family had been struggling for more than 10 years, having lost a business and their farm before being given a small plot of land and a broken down mobile home in Otisco for \$1. He had made the mobile home livable, and the family moved in in May 2011. Less than a year later, the home and the family's belongings were in ruins after being hit by two tornadoes on March 2. Hughes was near despair when separate families from Providence came to his aid.

Parsons collected donations from her family and also reached out to **Caroline Hughes '02**, who she knew from other charity work. Hughes said she was excited to help, especially since the family shared the same last name. She turned to her then-coworkers at Hughes Group (she is now president of CE Milling), and between the Happel family and the employees at Hughes Group, they raised several thousand dollars, which Ron Hughes initially refused but eventually used to help the family pay bills in their first few months of recovery since the businesses where he

provided floor maintenance were destroyed by the tornado as well.



Meanwhile, **Jack Koetter '72** and his sons, **Brage '03** and **Jack**, a junior at Providence, went to Henryville to help over Good Friday weekend. After clearing trees and brush, Koetter said he knew his expertise in construction could provide a more long-lasting benefit, and he sought out a family in need. Koetter Northgate

Properties, a commercial and retail property development business owned by Koetter, his wife, **Melanie (Gibbons) '74**, and their sons, was to sponsor the reconstruction for one family, and Koetter Construction, owned by Koetter and his brothers, another. Northgate was given Hughes' name.

Hughes said he was so angry at God the day Koetter stopped at his home that he refused his offer to help. But Koetter wouldn't back down, and the work to build the small, three-bedroom, wood frame house for the Hugheses and their four children ages 9-22 began. Jack assigned Brage

to oversee the project, and by May, Brage was working daily at the Hughes property. That summer, young Jack Koetter was there every day too. Their cousin Providence junior **Spencer Hoffman** and their friends helped as well. Jack and Melanie Koetter helped on the weekends.



Northgate paid for the labor, and other groups, including Henryville Community Church, paid for most of the materials to build the family's new home. Several subcontractors donated materials and/or labor, including Martin Plumbing. Another group of alumni that is known for volunteering its electrical services to Providence did the wiring in the house: **Dennis Ettl '74**, **Sonny Combs (Hon. '05)**, **Brian Combs '76**, **Richard Combs '77**, **Edward Combs '81**, **Joe Gronotte '79**, and Providence parent **Garv**

Mitchell.

Jack Koetter said he was just responding as his father, the late **Bob Koetter Sr. (Hon. '01)**, had taught him and his brothers - and by what they learned at Providence. He remembers many times growing up the family helped others in need with their construction expertise. It had been many years since he'd built a home, and he looked forward to offering those skills. Still, the family "didn't have any idea what we were getting into" when they set out to build the new home. "It turned out to be a really rewarding experience for all of us."



Brage Koetter agrees. Even though he had volunteered with his family on many other occasions, this one was different because of the large investment of his time. He became good friends with Hughes, who provided a lot of help on the building of his home. He also befriended the church groups that came from out of state to provide free labor and was inspired by their faith. The little miracles that happened along the way touched him as well, such as a crane truck happening to drive by on that back road the day the trusses were delivered and needed lifting. He is now working to finish a second home in Henryville, with labor sponsored by Koetter Construction. "It was an experience I'll remember for the rest of my life," Brage said. "I think everybody changed for the better."

Parsons and Caroline Hughes also were touched by the opportunity to help the Hughes family. Caroline said helping Ron Hughes and his family was "important to me because I wanted to help restore their hope." She was initially frustrated that all she could offer was money - and wondered if it would be enough. But when she heard Jack Koetter offered his help, she knew the family was in good hands. Seeing them bring happiness and security back into a family's life was meaningful. "I was lucky to experience the kindness firsthand, and I will never forget the generosity the Koettters bestowed upon a family in need."



Parsons said that at the dedication of the new home in September she was amazed to see so many Providence alumni among those who had helped the family. She said she was reminded of the song "It Only Takes a Spark" she and her classmates sang at Providence in 1976 and its chorus 'It only takes a spark to get a fire going; that's how it is with God's love. Pass it on.' "That is what happened here," she said. "It made me so proud to see the Providence family turn out to help, not only with Ron but in so many other situations."



Ron Hughes said he was touched by the generosity of time, talent and treasure provided by many people of Catholic faith who came to their aid -- Providence alumni and Catholic Charities, which installed new windshields in the family's cars. "At the end, I saw it was basically a Providence package," he said. "I can never forget the good that people did because the bad (of the tornado and its aftermath) never leaves my mind."
